

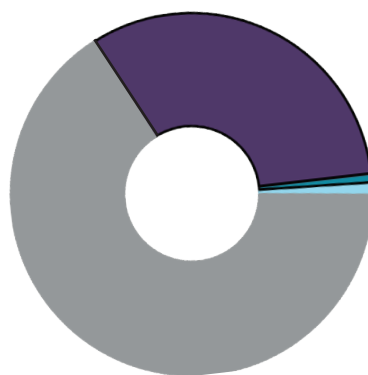
Arizona

Predominantly nonwhite school districts in Arizona have 46% less funding than predominantly white school districts, a gap that increases when narrowing the comparison to high-poverty districts. A look at racial disparities between school districts in Arizona, by the numbers.

RACIAL ISOLATION



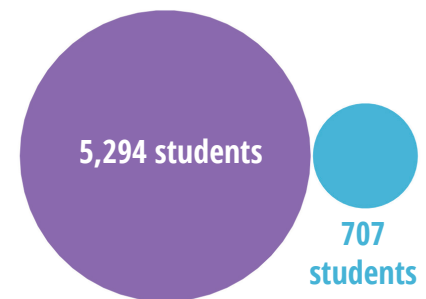
34% of Arizona students attend racially isolated school districts, with 32% of students in **nonwhite districts** and 2% in **white districts**.*



32% of Arizona students attend **high poverty, nonwhite districts** while 1% attend **high poverty, white districts**.†

DISTRICT SIZE

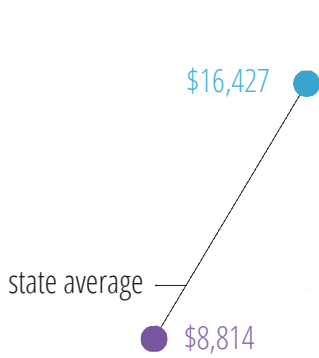
The average **white school district** in Arizona has just 707 students compared to 5,294 in the average **nonwhite school district**. The average high poverty, white district has 433 students compared to 5,920 in the average high poverty, nonwhite district.



FUNDING DISPARITIES

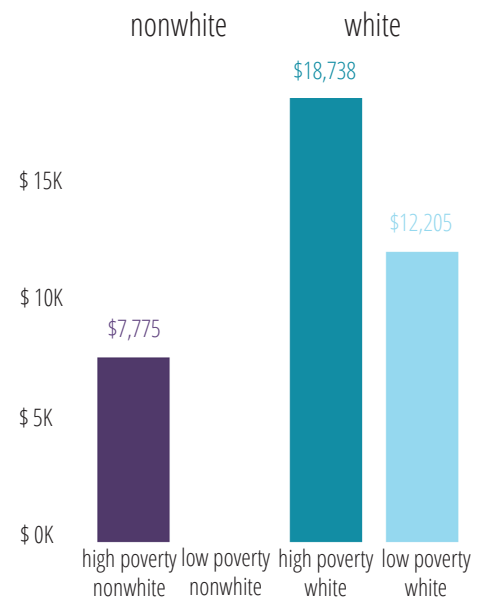
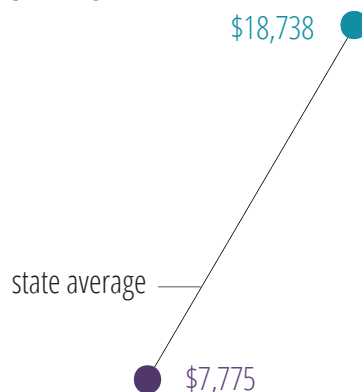
\$7,613 per student

That's how much more funding **high poverty, white school districts** in Arizona have, on average, compared to **high poverty, nonwhite school districts**.



* White districts are those where more than 75% of students are white. Nonwhite districts are those where more than 75% of students are nonwhite.

† High poverty white districts are those where more than 75% of students are white and where more than 20% of students live in poverty. High poverty nonwhite districts are those where more than 75% of students are nonwhite and where more than 20% of students live in poverty.
